
- What areas hold the potential to accelerate discovery and advance research outcomes through strengthened international cooperation?

Framework

- Increasing investments by other nations creates new communities of research excellence
- Growth of international collaboration in science
- Increasing research activity as collaboration within teams and networks
- Readiness for single networks to link as international networks-of-networks



Clarifying Terms in the DCL

Network

 Groups of investigators who communicate and coordinate their research and educational activities across organizational and international boundaries

Network-of-Networks

- Groups of networks that are coherently connected
 - Envisioned networks should go beyond existing or emerging concentrations of expertise and should strengthen community linkages across boundaries



Community Input on the following Areas:

All NSF-supported fields

- Nascent but not well-established networks &/or network linkages (all entities to be linked do not need to be fully formed; the size and scope of the entities will depend on the particular networks)
- Interdisciplinary topics encouraged but not required

Potential to accelerate discovery and advance research in areas where better international connection could:

- Leverage expertise, data, facilities, or other resources
- Strengthen U.S. research community
- Offer mutual benefit

What to include in the White Paper?

White Paper: Respond to 3 open-ended questions:

- What current or emerging research areas would benefit from increased cooperation between networks of researchers in the U.S. and networks in one or more countries outside the U.S.?
- What is the value added of international network-to-network collaboration for the U.S. research community in the research area(s)?
- What other relevant aspects should NSF consider to strengthen international research networks in the research area(s)?



Key words: Include up to 3 terms that represent keywords of your submission

Who is Eligible to Submit Ideas?

- Single individuals or multiple submitters
 - Provide name, affiliation, and email contact for all submitters
- Submission from U.S.-based researcher(s)
- International researchers may take part in team submission

Notes:

Responses to this DCL do not constitute any commitment on behalf of the submitters or their institutions to submit a proposal or carry out an international network-to-network project.



White Papers are submitted via SurveyMonkey directly by the submitter, without going through an institutional Sponsored Research Office.

Reminders

 We are seeking white papers on ideas ripe for international network-to-network collaboration, NOT proposals from fully formed teams for funding

 This Dear Colleague Letter call by OISE is a needs assessment, NOT a funding opportunity.



Webinar Q&A – page 1

- May I submit more than one White Paper?
 Yes. You may also participate in more than one group of submitters.
- Does a submission by a team carry more weight?
 No. We are looking at the content and quality of the ideas submitted, not quantity.
- Will NSF provide feedback to submitters on the White Papers?
 No. This is an information-gathering activity only.
- Is there an existing model that OISE has in mind?
 No. We encourage you to consider the nature and needs of the research field and specific networks you have in mind.

Webinar Q&A – page 2

- Do the networks have to be already formally established?
- Are there networks that would be too small or too advanced to be appropriate for White Paper topics?
- Do the international networks have to be already funded?

 No. The size and scope as well as level of maturity and funding of the networks you have in mind will vary. The focus of the DCL is research areas where better international connection could leverage resources, strengthen the US research community, and offer mutual benefit.

Topics involving well-established network may be appropriate if the White Paper describes how the existing network could be enhanced to accelerate discovery in that field. Likewise, topics for which no network exists may also be appropriate if the White Paper describes how the establishment of a network could accelerate discovery in that field.
