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I. INTRODUCTION

The social, behavioral, and economic sciences continue to develop more sophisticated theoretical frameworks for understanding complex social and behavioral science phenomena. Relatedly, these disciplines are collecting more and different kinds of data for analysis. New mathematical and statistical models and methods are needed to complement advances in theoretical development and data collection. Computationally intensive models, for example, often are required to illuminate diverse processes such as emergent behavior from individual decisions or human cognition and perception. Understanding aggregated processes such as market behavior or social mobility or public opinion often requires the development of sophisticated statistical models. New methods are needed for analyzing data that span both space and time, and problems like data confidentiality and disclosure would benefit from new approaches.

Mathematical and statistical methods and models, however, often are developed without specific social, behavioral, or economic processes in mind; as such, they may or may not be appropriate for furthering understanding of complex social and behavioral science phenomena. In like fashion, methods may be developed within specific subject matter areas without knowledge of complementary developments in other areas.

As part of NSF's Mathematical Sciences Priority Area, the Directorate for Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences (SBE) and the Division of Mathematical Sciences (DMS) in the Directorate for Mathematical and Physical Sciences (MPS) invite submission of research proposals for projects that advance the mathematical and/or statistical foundations of research in the social, behavioral, or economic sciences. Proposals for workshops or symposia that foster the interaction of social, behavioral, and/or economic scientists with mathematicians and/or statisticians also are welcome.

This is the third year for this competition. To view a list of awards from past competitions, consult the MSBS home page.

II. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The goals of the Mathematical Social and Behavioral Sciences (MSBS) funding opportunity are to:

• Advance the development of mathematical and statistical methods and models for understanding social, behavioral, and economic science phenomena.

- Facilitate the interaction of social, behavioral, and economic scientists with mathematicians and statisticians.
- Promote the cross-training of students in the social, behavioral, and economic sciences with the mathematical and statistical sciences.
- Encourage the broad dissemination of results across both the social, behavioral, and economic sciences and the mathematical and statistical sciences.

In order to advance those goals, NSF invites proposals for the following activities: (1) research projects and (2) facilitation activities, such as workshops or symposia.

1. Research Projects

Research projects must focus on problems at the intersection of the social, behavioral, or economic sciences and the mathematical or statistical sciences. The resulting research should advance understanding in both the social, behavioral, or economic sciences and the mathematical or statistical sciences. Investigators should make clear in their proposal the direct relationships they anticipate across the different scientific domains. Investigators should have expertise in both the substantive topics under consideration and the relevant statistical and/or mathematical approaches. Collaborations involving mathematicians or statisticians with social, behavioral, or economic scientists are especially encouraged.

Investigators are expected to disseminate their results broadly both to the relevant social and behavioral science communities and to the relevant mathematical or statistical communities. Proposals must include a description of plans for the dissemination of results.

Projects must integrate research with creative approaches to education. In particular, projects that clearly articulate methods for the cross training of graduate students and/or undergraduate students in the social, behavioral, or economic sciences and the mathematical sciences are highly encouraged.

2. Facilitation Activities

A small number of awards may be made to support facilitation activities, such as workshops or symposia, that provide a mechanism for social and behavioral scientists to interact with mathematicians or statisticians in meaningful ways. Investigators must describe how the proposed activities will result in new information and insights and how that information will be disseminated to the broader community. Facilitation awards will not be made to support activities whose primary output will be a new proposal for a larger project.

Review Information

All MSBS proposals will be evaluated with respect to their intellectual merit, their broader impacts, and their responsiveness to the goals of the MSBS competition. To that end, MSBS-specific review criteria have been established and reviewers will be directed to comment on these criteria. Research projects will be reviewed by a multidisciplinary panel including experts from both the social, behavioral, and economic sciences and the mathematical and statistical sciences.

III. ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

The categories of proposers identified in the Grant Proposal Guide are eligible to submit proposals under this program announcement/solicitation.

IV. AWARD INFORMATION

For research projects, NSF anticipates that most awards will range in duration from one to four years and have total award sizes ranging from \$150,000 to \$650,000.

For facilitation activities, awards may have durations of one to two years and have total award sizes of up to \$100,000.

NSF estimates funding 9 to 18 standard grants consisting of 8 to 15 research awards and 1 to 3 facilitation awards. The

anticipated funding amount is \$4.5 million for new awards, subject to availability of funds.

VI. PROPOSAL REVIEW INFORMATION

A. NSF Proposal Review Process

Reviews of proposals submitted to NSF are solicited from peers with expertise in the substantive area of the proposed research or education project. These reviewers are selected by Program Officers charged with the oversight of the review process. NSF invites the proposer to suggest, at the time of submission, the names of appropriate or inappropriate reviewers. Care is taken to ensure that reviewers have no conflicts with the proposer. Special efforts are made to recruit reviewers from non-academic institutions, minority-serving institutions, or adjacent disciplines to that principally addressed in the proposal.

The National Science Board approved revised criteria for evaluating proposals at its meeting on March 28, 1997 (NSB 97-72). All NSF proposals are evaluated through use of the two merit review criteria. In some instances, however, NSF will employ additional criteria as required to highlight the specific objectives of certain programs and activities.

On July 8, 2002, the NSF Director issued Important Notice 127, Implementation of new Grant Proposal Guide Requirements Related to the Broader Impacts Criterion. This Important Notice reinforces the importance of addressing both criteria in the preparation and review of all proposals submitted to NSF. NSF continues to strengthen its internal processes to ensure that both of the merit review criteria are addressed when making funding decisions.

In an effort to increase compliance with these requirements, the January 2002 issuance of the GPG incorporated revised proposal preparation guidelines relating to the development of the Project Summary and Project Description. Chapter II of the GPG specifies that Principal Investigators (PIs) must address both merit review criteria in separate statements within the one-page Project Summary. This chapter also reiterates that broader impacts resulting from the proposed project must be addressed in the Project Description and described as an integral part of the narrative.

Effective October 1, 2002, NSF will return without review proposals that do not separately address both merit review criteria within the Project Summary. It is believed that these changes to NSF proposal preparation and processing guidelines will more clearly articulate the importance of broader impacts to NSF-funded projects.

The two National Science Board approved merit review criteria are listed below (see the Grant Proposal Guide Chapter III.A for further information). The criteria include considerations that help define them. These considerations are suggestions and not all will apply to any given proposal. While proposers must address both merit review criteria, reviewers will be asked to address only those considerations that are relevant to the proposal being considered and for which he/she is qualified to make judgments.

What is the intellectual merit of the proposed activity?

How important is the proposed activity to advancing knowledge and understanding within its own field or across different fields? How well qualified is the proposer (individual or team) to conduct the project? (If appropriate, the reviewer will comment on the quality of the prior work.) To what extent does the proposed activity suggest and explore creative and original concepts? How well conceived and organized is the proposed activity? Is there sufficient access to resources?

What are the broader impacts of the proposed activity?

How well does the activity advance discovery and understanding while promoting teaching, training, and learning? How well does the proposed activity broaden the participation of underrepresented groups (e.g., gender, ethnicity, disability, geographic, etc.)? To what extent will it enhance the infrastructure for research and education, such as facilities, instrumentation, networks, and partnerships? Will the results be disseminated broadly to enhance scientific and technological understanding? What may be the benefits of the proposed activity to society?

NSF staff will give careful consideration to the following in making funding decisions:

Integration of Research and Education

One of the principal strategies in support of NSF's goals is to foster integration of research and education through the programs, projects, and activities it supports at academic and research institutions. These institutions provide abundant opportunities where individuals may concurrently assume responsibilities as researchers, educators, and students and where all can engage in joint efforts that infuse education with the excitement of discovery and enrich research through the diversity of learning perspectives.

Integrating Diversity into NSF Programs, Projects, and Activities

Broadening opportunities and enabling the participation of all citizens -- women and men, underrepresented minorities, and persons with disabilities -- is essential to the health and vitality of science and engineering. NSF is committed to this principle of diversity and deems it central to the programs, projects, and activities it considers and supports.

Additional Review Criteria:

In addition to the general criteria described above, all MSBS proposals will be evaluated with respect to their responsiveness to the goals of the MSBS competition. The following criteria will be considered by peer reviewers and NSF staff in evaluating proposals submitted in response to this solicitation. The first two criteria apply to MSBS research projects; the third applies to facilitation activities.

- 1. Does the research advance understanding in both the social, behavioral, or economic sciences and the mathematical or statistical sciences?
- 2. Does the project integrate research with creative approaches to education?
- 3. Will the proposed facilitation activities result in new information or insights?
- 4. Are the proposed dissemination activities appropriate?

B. Review Protocol and Associated Customer Service Standard

All proposals are carefully reviewed by at least three other persons outside NSF who are experts in the particular field represented by the proposal. Proposals submitted in response to this announcement/solicitation will be reviewed by Ad Hoc and/or panel review.

Reviewers will be asked to formulate a recommendation to either support or decline each proposal. The Program Officer assigned to manage the proposal's review will consider the advice of reviewers and will formulate a recommendation.

A summary rating and accompanying narrative will be completed and submitted by each reviewer. In all cases, reviews are treated as confidential documents. Verbatim copies of reviews, excluding the names of the reviewers, are sent to the Principal Investigator/Project Director by the Program Director. In addition, the proposer will receive an explanation of the decision to award or decline funding.

NSF is striving to be able to tell proposers whether their proposals have been declined or recommended for funding within six months. The time interval begins on the closing date of an announcement/solicitation, or the date of proposal receipt, whichever is later. The interval ends when the Division Director accepts the Program Officer's recommendation.

In all cases, after programmatic approval has been obtained, the proposals recommended for funding will be forwarded to the Division of Grants and Agreements for review of business, financial, and policy implications and the processing and issuance of a grant or other agreement. Proposers are cautioned that only a Grants and Agreements Officer may make commitments, obligations or awards on behalf of NSF or authorize the expenditure of funds. No commitment on the part of NSF should be inferred from technical or budgetary discussions with a NSF Program Officer. A Principal Investigator or organization that makes financial or personnel commitments in the absence of a grant or cooperative agreement signed by the NSF Grants and Agreements Officer does so at their own risk.

VII. AWARD ADMINISTRATION INFORMATION

A. Notification of the Award

Notification of the award is made to *the submitting organization* by a Grants Officer in the Division of Grants and Agreements. Organizations whose proposals are declined will be advised as promptly as possible by the cognizant NSF Program Division administering the program. Verbatim copies of reviews, not including the identity of the reviewer, will be provided automatically to the Principal Investigator. (See section VI.A. for additional information on the review process.)

B. Award Conditions

An NSF award consists of: (1) the award letter, which includes any special provisions applicable to the award and any numbered amendments thereto; (2) the budget, which indicates the amounts, by categories of expense, on which NSF has based its support (or otherwise communicates any specific approvals or disapprovals of proposed expenditures); (3) the proposal referenced in the award letter; (4) the applicable award conditions, such as Grant General Conditions (NSF-GC-1); * or Federal Demonstration Partnership (FDP) Terms and Conditions * and (5) any announcement or other NSF issuance that may be incorporated by reference in the award letter. Cooperative agreement awards are administered in accordance with NSF Cooperative Agreement Financial and Administrative Terms and Conditions (CA-FATC). Electronic mail notification is

the preferred way to transmit NSF awards to organizations that have electronic mail capabilities and have requested such notification from the Division of Grants and Agreements.

Consistent with the requirements of OMB Circular A-16, *Coordination of Geographic Information and Related Spatial Data Activities*, and the Federal Geographic Data Committee, all NSF awards that result in relevant geospatial data must be submitted to Geospatial One-Stop in accordance with the guidelines provided at: www.geodata.gov.

C. Reporting Requirements

For all multi-year grants (including both standard and continuing grants), the PI must submit an annual project report to the cognizant Program Officer at least 90 days before the end of the current budget period.

Within 90 days after the expiration of an award, the PI also is required to submit a final project report. Failure to provide final technical reports delays NSF review and processing of pending proposals for the PI and all Co-PIs. PIs should examine the formats of the required reports in advance to assure availability of required data.

PIs are required to use NSF's electronic project reporting system, available through FastLane, for preparation and submission of annual and final project reports. This system permits electronic submission and updating of project reports, including information on project participants (individual and organizational), activities and findings, publications, and other specific products and contributions. PIs will not be required to re-enter information previously provided, either with a proposal or in earlier updates using the electronic system.
